15. A bit larger than nearby Herring Golls, with light pinkish legs, heavy bill light in coloration with blackish tip. Plumage strongly white throughout, including all the way to wing tips, which were seen clearly as bird took flight.

Ft. Livingston

Flew close to surface of water, with labored deep wing beats and heavy-bodied appearance.

(The perception of each observer differed as to eye color, which makes us a bit uncertain about whether this was a first or second year bird.)
