1. Species: Couch's/Tropical Kingbird Tyrannus couchii/melancholicus
2. Number: one of unknown age, sex
3. Locality: Louisiana; Cameron Parish; Baton Rouge Audubon Sanctuary at Peveto Beach
4. Date: 1 May 2004
5. Time: appx. 16:30 cdt
6. Reporting observer: B. Mac. Myers III; 5660 Ada Pl.--rear apt.; New Orleans, LA 70124-2811
7. Accompanying observer: Gay Gomez
8. Independent observers: no definite ones; Danny Dobbs reported a similar kingbird perhaps a mile or less east of there the following day
9. Light conditions: overcast with light rain; but not bad, the bird was low, and the light was particularly good when it flew down with a background of the grass/ground cover
10. Optics: 10x42 Eagle, excellent condition
11. Distance: $60-85$ yds., perhaps a little less
12. Duration: 3-4 minutes
13. Habitat: the field just east of the sanctuary chenier woods; grassy with mixed forbs, some shrubs and scattered oaks
14. Behavior: perched on outer branch of shrub; made several sallies for insects; a couple of time flew down within a foot of the ground
15. Description: Obviously a yellow-bellied kingbird. Underparts bright yellow to upper breast; throat white/pale gray. Gray head with darker mask from bill through eye/auriculars. Bill dark, rather long, fairly heavy; certainly larger than Western Kingbird (one seen nearby the day before). Back darker than WEKI, sort of olive. Tail dark brown/sooty, moderate notch, no white outer rectrices, tip of tail slightly paler. Excellent looks at the tail when it flew down near the ground and fanned it; excellent views both at rest and several times in flight. Went to get tape recorder, camera and Curt. While I was
gone, Gay saw the bird fly off to the east. The rain was worse. I played tapes to no avail. We did not relocate it.
16. Voice: unfortunately silent
17. Similar species: I think that the combination of coloration of underparts, bill size, tail shape and coloration eliminate other kingbirds except this pair.
18. Photographs: none; I had left my camera and tape recorder in the truck because it was raining pretty good when we started into the woods
19. Experience: several of this type in LA; some Couch's in Texas and one in LA; some Tropical in AZ and many in the tropics; plenty of Cassin's and Westerns and several Thick-billed in the southwest.
20. Aids: none at the time; don't recall about later
21. Description made (almost verbatim transcription) from notes made in the field. - copt an tach
22. Yes, I am certain about identification to this species pair, but not to species
