Stress features that separate it from similar species): A very long-legged, long-necked, bright pink bird with the classic bent bill of a flamingo. Relatively uniformly pink throughout body, except for noticeably brighter pink upperwing coverts (on folded wing; black of flight feathers barely visible in folded wing). Basal 60% (or so) of bill was pale, or horn-colored (distance and glare made it difficult to see well), distal 40% of bill was black. Pale iris. Legs all pink, brighter at tarsal joint.

- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Other flamingos possible as escapees—all are distinctly smaller, have notably paler plumage, or differ in soft parts colors, particularly leg color.
