1. English and Scientific names: Audubon's Shearwater, *Puffinus lherminieri*
2. Number of individuals, sexes, ages, general plumage (e.g., 2 in alternate plumage):

Specific Locality: ca. 36-37 mi SE of South Pass
4. Date(s) when observed: 2 September 2017
5. Time(s) of day when observed: Encountered from 12:30-12:31 p.m. (adjusted for the fact that my timestamps are an hour off as I had the camera set for a different time zone).
6. Reporting observer and address: Paul E. Conover, Lafayette LA
7. Other observers accompanying reporter who also *identified* the bird(s): Many; pelagic trip

12. Duration of observation: 1-2 minutes
13. Habitat: blue water
14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Judging from the photos, this bird was only seen on the wing, and seen only briefly.

Small "black and white" shearwater, dark above, pale below.

Facial features not readily discernible but there appears to be a hint of white around the eye.

This individual appeared fresher than most others seen during the day, although photo views are limited. Underwing with white lining, and dark leading and trailing edge, with dark intruding into the wing lining near the distal end of the humerus. Undertail coverts

dark. Collar not conspicuous in angles photographed, or perhaps absent.

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Dark distal undertail coverts, broadly outlined underwings with dark internal markings in combination point to Audubon's. Lack of view of facial pattern is a minus.
