9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): solid low overcast, occasional light rain early, clearing to high overcast.

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Swarovski EL Swarovision 10x42 binocular

11. Distance to bird(s): 10 feet to in hand.

12. Duration of observation: 1 hour 41 minutes according to Brady's eBird submission. In hand for about 7 minutes.

13. Habitat: Semi rural with a partial canopy of mature Live Oak [*Quercus virginana*]; it is a large property with several acres fenced as pasturage.

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Initially, this bird was perched in a Crepe Myrtle [*Lagerstroemia indica*] next to the parking area. Then, it moved to a Pencil Cactus [*Euphorbia tirucalli*] in a cove behind the house. It vocalized almost constantly as is their usual behavior. Flight was jerky with a lot of tail movement somewhat reminiscent of Black-chinned Hummingbird [*Archilochus alexandri*] movement.

15. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*):

Crown, nape, back, and rump dull darkish green. Entire underparts dull gray. There was a suggestion of a white post ocular line, but that was not as definite as is usual for the species. The long, wide, slightly notched tail was black with small white spots on the tips of R 3, R 4, and R 5. The long, broad bill was blackish with a suggestion of red near the bases of both maxilla and mandible. Eyes were dark brown, appearing black in the field. Legs and feet were dull black.

16. Voice: a harsh 'ji dit', somewhat similar to the call of a Ruby-crowned Kinglet, but more flat. This individual vocalized constantly, even while it was in a holding bag, waiting to be examined, a behavioral trait that I have noted with other members of this species.

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Nothing else in North America, north of Mexico, is really close in appearance. At a very brief glimpse, because of its plain gray underparts, female Ruby-throated Hummingbird [*Archilochus colubris*] or female Black-chinned Hummingbird [*Archilochus alexandri*] come to mind, but those species are smaller and mostly paler gray on the throat and breast. White-eared Hummingbird is also smaller and shows a more distinct white postocular stripe. Additionally, female White-eareds show some green spangling on their flanks, which this individual lacked.. Female Magnificent Hummingbirds are larger and lack any red coloration on the bill. Furthermore, all of the aforementioned species give very different vocalizations than those of Broad-billed Hummingbirds.
