Came in to mob tape silently and unnoticed, but saw it moving its head inquisitively as mob tape continued. Could not see rect pattern so I started playing ATFL to see if I could get a vocal response. It moved closer to my speaker in response, where I could see that it was fairly large-billed, but still did not respond. I started playing BCFL and it vocalized immediately and aggressively flew in very close to the speaker.

A *Myiarchus* flycatcher with yellow breast paler than expected on GCFL, pale gray upper breast and chin, large-billed, brown crest, and distinct BCFL tail pattern of dark brown edging that wraps around tail tip with rufous interior rectrices.
