Several others also saw the bird during this day, including Van Remsen, Joan Garvey, Mark Meunier, et al. Bird was initially discovered 12 April, I believe.
- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Bird was in shade during AM encounter, unshaded beneath bright, but cloudy, sky during PM encounter
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Swarovski 8x30 binos (good condition), Nikon AF-S 300 mm 1:4 D camera lens (good condition)
- 11. Distance to bird(s): 8-15 m

- 12. Duration of observation: 4-5 sec during AM encounter; on-and-off for 2-3 min during PM encounter
- 13. Habitat: hackberry-honey locust chenier and scrubby borders
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Presumably foraging, for the most part, but bird was difficult to follow for very long; skulky, and would seeming disappear inexplicably for periods of time
- 15. Stress features that separate it from similar species): Straightforward ID... Vireo w/ jet black crown and face, contrasting w/ bright white (bold) eyering, lores, and throat.
