- 13. Habitat: Backyard with Oak tree backed up by grassy field and lined by wooded area
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Feeding on a Peanut Delight Suet Feeder. She was feeding in low light conditions and flew into the Oak tree. About 5 minutes later, she came back to the same feeder but more light was shining on the feeder. She fed about 45 seconds each time.

Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): When I observed her, I thought she was a female rose-breasted grosbeak but the coloring didn't seem accurate especially since the first sighting was in low light. After the light became better, I could see a buff to yellowish coloring on the breast/belly area. Prominent eyebrow could be seen.

- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): I was undecided about the female rose-breasted grosbeak so I posted a picture on the Louisiana Birds and Birdwatching Facebook page for help with ID. Erik Johnson, Director of the Bird Conservation Audubon Louisiana at National Audubon Society commented on the picture with an identification and Jane Patterson concurred with the Identification
