- 8. Other observers who independently identified the bird(s): Stuart Head, my neighbor has seen the bird on 11-26-20 (Thanksgiving). He is 2 houses down on the bayou.
- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Raining at the time of sighting, 67 degrees and no wind.
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Binoculars (Canon 12x36 IS II)
- 11. Distance to bird(s): 200 feet
- 12. Duration of observation: 15 minutes

- 13. Habitat: Very old, tall cypress trees line Hynson Bayou in Alexandria. Bird was seen in our yard, which is 1.5 acres along the bayou. Bird observed in the tops of very tall cypress trees that line Hynson Bayou.
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Foraging and feeding in cypress trees. He seems to be flying with a pack, orange-crowned warbler, pine warbler, kinglets and woodpeckers. The bird never stops moving.
- 15. Black and white bird with black streaked sides. Black and White face with gray back. White underparts. Black throat. I did not see the Yellow spot above the lores as bird was too far away.
