9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): late evening around and after sunset, so poor light overall.
10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): mostly naked eye and using my Nikon Coolpix P900.

13. Habitat: suburban backyard with extensive bird-friendly plantings and feeders.

11. Distance to bird(s): between 15 ft and about 50 yards.

12. Duration of observation: Total collapsed time about 1 min.

- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): First detected by call as it flew unseen around rear of yard, then was spotted in mid-story of water oak at side of yard. Finally, it arrived at the feeders by house for three brief feedings. Difficult to see well.

Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen*; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species, body bulk, shape, proportions, bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species): Very large hummingbird with bold and large white corners to tail. Pale gray overall with white supercilium behind eye.
- 16. Voice: loud and distinctive "SEEK" heard often when bird was present.
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Size, large white tail corners, and call eliminate the most confusable option: Rivoli's Hummingbird. Call and lack of rufous throat eliminate Amethyst-throated Mountain-Gem.
- 18. Photographs or tape recordings obtained? (by whom? attached?): I got poor video with voice audible. Gary got one photo, but the bird has been photographed extensively by others before and after my visit. Gary's photo during my visit available here: https://ebird.org/checklist/S99661673
- 19. Previous experience with this species: Fairly extensive in SE Arizona, west Texas, and Mexico. I had seen the species only about 4 days earlier in Oaxaca, Mexico.
