- 12. Duration of observation: 5 sec
- 13. Habitat: Residential neighborhood; yard with many shrubby areas and bird-friendly plantings

- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Feeding at hummingbird feeder. I only saw the bird from the side as it perched on the feeder nectaring.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species, body bulk, shape, proportions, bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species): A \*large\* hummingbird (would dwarf Ruby-throat or Rufous if adjacent; I saw both of those species in the yard at the time, but not side-by-side). Long-tailed, and long-winged. Uniformly pale gray below, including throat, breast and belly, with no markings. Dull greenish above (crown, name, back) with faint buff color on sides of rump (only saw bird from the side). Distinct and conspicuous whitish postocular stripe bordering indistinct greenish auriculars, which border pale grayish malar and throat.
- 16. Voice: Not known to be vocal when I was present
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Only other huge hummingbird likely to be considered north of Mexico is Rivoli's, which lacks a large and conspicuous pale postocular stripe.
- 18. Photographs or tape recordings obtained? (by whom? Attached?): No, my observation was too brief.
- 19. Previous experience with this species: Have seen plenty in Arizona, but it's been a few years.
