Gray head was much darker than Western Kingbird, throat was darker gray than the pale gray of the Western Kingbird

- 18. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Western Kingbird has very pale gray throat and pale gray breast; this bird had a dark gray throat and breast. Western Kingbird has a light gray head and this bird's head was dark gray
