- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Eagle Optis Shrike, 8 x 42, fair condition Nikon D7200 w/ 70-300mm lens, good condition
- 11. Distance to bird(s): 3-4 meters

- 12. Duration of observation: approximately 10 minutes
- 13. Habitat: Tall phragmites on east side of gravel road/oil and gas production facility on west side of road
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Bird was originally seen on west side of road on wire. The bird was then observed foraging/sallying out after flying insects and perched on wire.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen*; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*):

Medium sized flycatcher with grey head, black mask from the beak to behind the eyes, back is greenish yellow with darker wing tips. It has a dark, notched tailed without any white on the edges. It is yellow, bright yellow at that, from the tail to the undersides of the wings up to the neck. At that point the bird has white neck patch up to a black, barely noticeable hook on the bill.

- 16. Voice: The bird made a brr, brr (excuse th phonetics) type call.
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): None at initial observation, mis-identified as Western Kingbird. After reviewing bird guide, realized that the yellow on the chest went up too high to be W. Kingbird along with olive greenish-yellow back. Eliminated WEKI because this bird did not have white edges on tail.
