11. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Swarovski 12x50 bins, 1 year old; Nikon P900.

12. Distance to bird(s): Less than 40 feet.

13. Duration of observation: About 10 minutes.

14. Habitat: Large open pasture bordering riparian area along Saline Bayou. Bird was found in old, mature pecan tree along side of highway.

15. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Heard calling repeatedly, was foraging for flying insects and sallying from tree. Some preening.

Stress features that separate it from similar species):

From eBird report: "Photos. Vocal rec of chip notes eliminates TRKI. Photos should show bill profile. Not long like some TRKI. Bright yellow bellied kingbird with mostly gray head, paler auriculars and throat, greenish back, darker flight feathers, heard vocaling first then found in pecan tree by side of highway and next to bayou and "Crawbilly's" closed restaurant." Additionally, after I played COKI chips, the bird called and flew low directly overhead and landed on utility and continued calling.

17. Voice: Heard calling initially. Possibly in response to pishing/screech-owl calls I had been giving about 150 ft away along bayou and to several responding birds. Calls mostly single notes, similar in tone to other tyrant flycatchers like STFL or VEFL. About the same pitch as Song Sparrow.

18. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): TRKI eliminated by vocalization. While bill length is not solely conclusive and can overlap, bill length was not noticeably long. WEKI eliminated because bright yellow extended all the way from base of throat through undertail coverts.
