- 14. Habitat: Grassy with several short trees (Bird-Banding Trail in Red River NWR)

Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Sitting quietly in the top of a tree near the entrance to the trail. Tolerated my presence well and very easy to see. I left it after taking a few pictures to keep from harassing it and went to the end of the trail. On my return, the bird had become more active and was snatching flies out of the air. Seemed to be loosely associated with a group of Scissor-tailed Flycatchers and also tolerated many other species, such as House Finches, Mourning Doves, Northern Cardinals, and American Robins. Only bird to show aggression was a Northern Mockingbird, which chased it away.

Stress features that separate it from similar species):

Kingbird with strikingly yellow breast, gray head, greenish-yellow back. Breast showed no gray of any kind. White throat with weak contrast compared to head. Bill quite thick and longer than eye + lores. Much larger than House Finch that perched beside it (shown in picture).

- 18. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Low-contrast throat, extent of yellow on breast, and large size of bill seem to rule out Cassin's and Western Kingbird. I ruled out Tropical Kingbird only on the basis of other birders' reports.

- 20. Previous experience with this species: I found a Couch's Kingbird (originally reported as Couch's/Tropical) on 11/4/14 and relocated it on 1/24/15. I had to rely on the reports of other birders to identify it as Couch's.

Fairly certain, but not positive. I don't have good experience distinguishing Couch's from Tropical Kingbird and would not have reported it as Couch's on my own; however, the large number of birders who have reported this bird is a good indication that the ID is correct.
