- 12. Distance to bird(s): Bird was about 20ft in a tree the first time in spotted it. It flew to another tree and was about 30ft up.

- 14. Habitat: Large lake with manicured grounds used for weddings. Surrounding forest was hilly. I've birded here with good results.

I saw the bird and though it was another Ea. Bluebird(there were a few flying around) to add to my eBird checklist.

Once I got a good look at it, I noticed it was very yellow in the chest which ruled out the EABL. I looked again thinking it was an Ea. Phoebe but the chest was still way too yellow for the EAPH. It thought the light was playing tricks at first because the bird was backlit.

I had the general idea of what a non-Eastern Kingbird looked like so I quickly checked my bird app to look at the other kinds of Kingbirds looked like. The bird looked like a Western or Tropical/Couch's Kingbird. I knew that was a rare bird for the area and knew I needed to try and get some photos.

Unfortunately, I had left my Nikon camera in the car about a 1/4 mile away. I tried getting photos with my phone camera through my binos but the bird flew away to another tree. Luckily, it flew a much better position and I was able get a few photos through my binos with my phone. Soon after the bird flew away and I couldn't find it again. I came back about 15mins later with my actual camera and was unable to relocate the bird.

- 17. Voice: None. Even if it had called there was a very loud group of Common Grackles nearby to drown it out.
- 18. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Eastern Phoebe- Seemed a little too big for an Eastern Phoebe and very bright yellow on the chest.

Western Kingbird- The yellow chest went pretty far up the chest. The field guides showed the yellow much lower on the chest and not as bright for a Western Kingbird compared to a Tropical/Couch's.
