This bird was first photographed by William Childs January 30, 2021, who lives at the address cited above. He says it was there a few days before he took the photo but he has no record of those dates. It was last observed March 1, 2021 by William. It was observed at this location on many days between the date of the first observation and the last observation on March 1.

This bird was seen by me in the middle of the day on more than one day. Light conditions vary from day to day.

## 11. Distance to bird(s):

This distance varied, but when I took the accompanying photos, the distance varied from about three to four meters.

About two hours on the day I took the photos

#### 13. Habitat:

Suburban backyard with bird feeder and mowed grass. The area is somewhat hilly with many houses and pine trees.,

Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): My observation of this bird was that it came to eat seeds that had fallen on the ground from the raised bird feeder. It would leave for a while and then return to eat seeds again. It did this many times.

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): This bird was very similar to the Yellow-eyed Junco (*Junco plaenotus*) except that the Yellow-eyed Junco has yellow eyes while this bird dark eyes.

It is also very similar to the Red-backed Junco ( <i>Junco hyemalis dorsalis</i> ), but the Red-backed Junco has a dark upper bill. Upper and lower bills of this individual are both light colored.
