A large and stocky "white" gull with pink legs, pink bill with blackish subterminal mark, and dark eyes.

Body overall white with a few faint beige smudges on mantle and on breast. There may have been some Pale gray mantle feathers.



Much heavier-bodied than the Herring Gulls it was seen near, with a low-slung belly and seemingly wider-set legs.



Head mainly white, with medium-dark brown eyes. Bill more or less parallel-sided without strong gonydeal angle or bulbous tip. Wide but not clearly demarcated blackish subterminal band covering most of the area between the nostrils and bill tip. Dark eye and faded bill tip indicate first year bird.



Wings and tail with white flight feathers. Tips of the flight feathers were badly worn and reduced to worn shafts.
