Kevin initially noted a distant unusual raptor, but was unsure if the ID. As it came closer, he showed me some photos, which we both thought were suggestive of Golden Eagle. I got out of the car and got some photos as well, and the bird came close enough to secure the identification. Large raptor with broad wings, proportionally small head. Dark below and on wings, besides white patches on base of primaries and white tail band. The tail band especially stood out because of the backlighting on the bird, and is very evident in the photos. The bird appeared to have the characteristic golden nape as well, though this was not the easiest to see due to the angle and distance. However, the other markings noted above are still diagnostic for Golden Eagle
