8. Other observers who independently identified the bird(s):

I'm not sure. Bill F., Bill V., Molly and Patty already found the bird before the rest of us got there. We all heard it when it vocalized, but I don't know if you could say we independently IDed it since we were told it was around when we arrived.

9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light):

It was overcast, so the light was diffused to the point where there were no shadows. The

level of light was moderate, so we had no problem seeing, but there was no direct light.

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition):

Swarovski SLC 10x42 in good condition; Canon 5D Mk II with Canon EF 100-400 f 4.5-5.6L IS USM lens.

11. Distance to bird(s):

20-30 yds

12. Duration of observation: Approx. 10 min.

13. Habitat:

The bird was in low brush initially, but perched high in some deciduous trees on the side of the road when recordings of GTTO were played. Mostly, it stayed in the thick understory of Chinese privet and greenbriers.

- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): The bird came in response to tape. We heard it first, then we saw it in the underbrush. It flew up to the canopy for a minute or so, then returned to the underbrush. The bird also had been observed for some time prior to our arrival. It responded to recordings, hung around for about 10 minutes, then disappeared into the underbrush.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen*; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species, body bulk, shape, proportions, bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species):

The crown was reddish-brown. The maxilla and feet appeared grey, while the mandible was blue-grey. The forehead, lores and malar were black. The eyes appeared brown. The chin, throat and submustachial stripe were white. The body was mostly bluish-grey with green in the wings and tail. The back, parts of the wings and distal portion of the tail were grey.

16. Voice:

This bird made a few of the "Me-yew" vocalizations in response to the tape.

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation):

This bird was a large sparrow-sized bird. The reddish-brown crown and green parts of the wings and tail eliminate other towhees. The size and vocalization eliminated Olive Sparrow. The relatively dull green and lack of yellow eliminated Green Jay.

Others may have photographed it before I got there, but after I arrived, I was the only one who took pictures. I will attach the photos.
