- 13. Habitat: Edge of hardwood forest across from a canal.
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Responding to EASO mob tape; flicking wings on 12/5.

Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): Empid with olive upper parts and darker wings with white wing bars; long primary extension; white eye-ring more pronounced at the rear of the eye; bright yellow breast with darker streaking toward the flanks; bill mostly horn-colored.

- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Wing flicking is indicative of the species. Conover keyed out the wings in the field and concluded that it matched Hammond's.
