- 13. Habitat: Rural-suburban backyard with plethora of bird feeders, though sparsely vegetated
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Flew in silently with AMGO flock where I noticed it in the lone tree in the yard. Shortly came down to feeders and ate black oil sunflower seeds
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen*; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): A goldfinch noticeably brighter yellow in the breast than nearby AMGO, with black "unibrow" cap from bill base to the top of the crown. Bill short, triangular, olive green to black. Lacking distinct white wingbars of AMGO, instead with messy looking, cream colored edging to primary coverts. White base to primaries difficult to see, but still visible
