- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light):

Clear sky with optimal afternoon sunlight. Sun angle fairly high and away from observer. Backlighting or glare not problematic.

- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Zeiss Victory FL 8x42, Kowa TSN 88 series w/ 88 mm angled eyepiece (40-60x zoom), Canon Powershot HS 110 digital elph point-and-shoot camera (equipment in excellent condition).
- 11. Distance to bird(s): ca. 3-5 meters
- 12. Duration of observation: ~1-2 min.
- 13. Habitat: Overgrown, brushy woodlot w/ sct. live oaks, hackberries, red mulberries, honeylocusts, yaupon, baccharis, saltcedars, etc. Favoring tall mixed grasses-baccharis thickets along wooded edges nr. standing pools of water.
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation):

Finally observed after extensive and intensive search high and low around previously described locations. First observed much farther east of the burned area in dense, overgrown tall grasses and baccharis scrub. It was solitary and not in association with any other species. It was silently foraging at about eye level nr. tops of vegetation but occasionally dropping down and out of view. Only brief unobstructed views before it moved off. Never observed in flight.

15. Stress features that separate it from similar species):

A small, grayish, non-descript, short-tailed warbler with drab gray upperparts and slightly paler underparts. Prominent, white oribital rings around eyes. Russetbrown patch on uppertail coverts. Paler, buffy tips to upperwing coverts (indicative of first-winter plumage). Small, short, black bill. Dull blackish legs and feet. Dark irides.

Also, lack of response to playback coupled with overall drabber plumage features suggestive of individual being a female.

Not similar to any other N.A. warblers.
