- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Varying; bird spends a great deal of time foraging in dense vine tangles, with minimal sunlight, but occasionally pops out in the open for brief views in sunlight. Today was observed foraging in the open branches of a *Morus rubra*.
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Vortex 8x42 Diamondbacks
- 11. Distance to bird(s): Varying; ca. 15-30 ft.
- 12. Duration of observation: ca. 10-30 minutes

- 13. Habitat: Predominately *Quercus virginiana* forest with other hardwood species with lots of underbrush and vines (*Cayratia japonicas*, *Parthenocissus quinquefolia*, *Rubus* spp., *Smilax* spp., etc.)
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Bird spends the majority of the time foraging in dense vine tangles, mostly close to the ground (ca. 3-6 ft.), but has been observed foraging higher as well (ca. 15 ft.).
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen*; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): Bright yellow-colored underparts with pinkish legs. Wings yellowish-green with no wingbars. Back olive-grayish with dark gray hood and darker face with bold white eye arcs above eyes.
- 16. Voice: Call note, a distinct "tip, tip".
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Mourning Warbler, *Geothlypis philadelphia* lacks bold white arcs in adults and has a distinctly different chip note. Nashville Warbler, *Leiothlypis ruficapilla* has bold white eyering, not arcs, yellow throat, darker legs and distinctly different chip note.
