- 13. Habitat: thick vines in forest
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): The bird was working through the vines, loosely associated with a Ruby-crowned Kinglet and Orange-crowned Warbler. It was initially heard calling in response to my squeaking and then subsequently located and seen. Bird was at eye level and below.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen*; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): An *Oporornis* warbler (yellowish back/chest/breast/undertail) with grayish head. Bill heavy and light colored underside. White eye crescents with dark black lores. Throat lighter gray. No wing bars.
- 16. Voice: hard "tsik" see recording
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Mourning Warbler lacks eye crescents. Connecticut Warbler has an eye ring.
