Complete views of the bird were only obtained when it flushed out of the understory revealing a chunky; long tailed warbler with a green back and heavy contrasting gray head; while moving around in the understory I would get split second glimpses of the bird; though very dark views I could see that the bird had eye arcs consistent with what I've observed previously with an adult male MGWA

- 17. Voice: Incessant harsh chip notes; almost wet sounding;
- 18. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Mourning Warbler eliminated by both bold eye arcs; and date. April 21 would be exceptionally early for this species. Common Yellowthroat eliminated by gray hooded appearance and vocalizations were not consistent with COYE
