9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): It was fairly sunny but the bird was in the open.

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): binoculars, 8x42, literally brand new (I have had them for maybe a week and only used them 2-3 times). That being said I took pictures through the lense and it did dull some of the colors that we saw in person. The feet don't look as pink and the bill does not look as blue

11. Distance to bird(s): 10-20 meters. We were fairly close as it flew maybe 5-6 over our

head before landing on a small construction cone not far from our car.

12. Duration of observation: 3-4 minutes

13. Habitat: Out in the open next to by a soccer field

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): It just flew over the top of us, landed not far away and didn't really move, just kind of sat there for a few minutes and then took off again heading south

It wasn't a huge bird, maybe like a large mallard for frame of reference? I've never seen a Booby before but I knew how rare they were so tried to take as many mental notes as I could. Brown all over, blue bill with pinkish/yellowish feet

16. Voice: I actually heard it before I saw anything and thought it was a heron at first. Kind of guttural and croaky. Hard to describe sounds obviously but most of the sounds that I have looked up after the fact match that of the red footed booby and not the brown booby
