- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Perched on pole, alert to my presence; flew at least once but returned to another pole
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): I saw the bird as I was driving down the highway ca. 60 mph, saw the distinctive pattern (pale head, dark belly), told myself it couldn't be a Rough-leg but rather a poorly seen Krider's. An abrupt U-turn brought me back past the bird but I drove past it at normal highway speed to not flush it and didn't stop for about a half-mile; then, I turned around, parked, and scoped the bird. It was obviously a Rough-legged. I snapped a few marginally identifiable doc shots, and then slowly did a stop-and-go approach to get better and better photos, taking care to stay inside the car as much as possible.

The photos do a better job than any written description in showing the characters that indicate Rough-legged Hawk.
