Rather large for a wren, with proportionally fairly short tail (again, by standards of a wren), and rather chunky. Wings extended about a third of the way down the tail. Fairly standard thin slightly decurved wren bill, black with a pale pinkish base. Overall coloration sandy brown, slightly darker on the wings, neck, and tail, as well as top of head. Light orange around base of legs, extending up to the lower flanks and a little onto the breast, though notably paler the farther from the legs. Throat, cheek, and under tail more white than anywhere else on bird. Also a few dark bands on under tail. Wings and tail barred with dull black, with a few white spots on the scapulars.Distinct orange-tan supercillium, dark lores and eye, grey legs.

17. Voice: Did to vocalize

18. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Carolina and Bewick's Wren are very different structurally, with much longer tails, and also much richer brown coloration. The same is true of House and Winter Wrens, which are also much smaller. No real identification concerns for experienced observers at close range
