- 8. Other observers who independently identified the bird(s): unclear, at least two other observers identified Couch's Kingbird at this site, but no one produced documentation.
- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Late afternoon to sunset.
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Zeiss 10x40 binocular
- 11. Distance to bird(s): 40-150m

- 12. Duration of observation: Maybe 20 min during the period given above.
- 13. Habitat: Perched on wires, fences, and treetops around park.
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): My attention was first drawn to the bird by David and Cameron who were watching it through a scope. It then moved around with the Western Kingbirds and Scissor-tailed Flycatchers that were arriving to roost, and we relocated it several times before we left at sunset.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): Large yellow-bellied Tyranus. Large bill (making us think it was likely a Tropical), dark, but not black, notched tail. Yellow undertparts reaching throat. Green back.
- 16. Voice: None given, hence the identification to species pair rather than to species. We played back both Tropical and Couch's but the bird did not seem particularly interested.
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Bill size, tail shape and color, and lack of grayish breast eliminate Western and Cassin's (both present for comparison, to boot). Bill to heavy for White-throated.
