- 8. Other observers who independently identified the bird(s): Bird was first found by Joelle Finley and Ken Harris during the New Orleans CBC Dec. 26, 2015. It did not vocalize then and proved elusive when I and others went in search of it. However, on Jan. 2 2016 they re-found the bird and it vocalized, giving typical TRKI rolling trill calls. I found it later that day but it was silent and I got no photos. Many others have reported it since.
- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): **Overcast Jan. 2**; **sunny March 13**.
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): **Eagle Optic Platinum series, 10x; Canon Powershot SX 50**
- 11. Distance to bird(s): within 100 feet
- 12. Duration of observation: Jan. 2 = < I min; > March 13 = 10 min. or so.

- 13. Habitat: Former (pre-Katrina) golf course sub-division, now overgrown with low to high grasses and herbaceous cover, scattered trees, including clumps of volunteer saplings and small woodlots shaping the edges of former fairways, interspersed with ponds with marshy edges and emergent vegetation.
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Perching on exposed branches, a fence, flying good distances between perches, and (March 13) sallying and capturing prey; interacting with STFL which was dominant and chased it from airspace and perches (but it did not retreat very far and challenged more than once, including successfully snatching prey (bumblebee?) near the STFL).
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. A yellow-bellied kingbird with a gray head, dark mask; yellow belly and gray-green upper breast; white throat; gray back with green overtones, black-brown wings (flight feathers and coverts narrowly edged white); black-brown tail shallowly forked, no white on outer vanes; robust (but not huge as in some TRKI) black bill. Photo (below) shows tail feather growing in. On Jan. 2 I described tail as "worn".
