1. English and Scientific names: TTropical Kingbird-Tyrannus melancholicus or Couch's Kingbird-Tyrannus couchii

2. Number of individuals, sexes, ages, general plumage (e.g., 2 in alternate plumage):One individual with clear frontal view using high end Canon IS10x42 binos. Brilliant yellow breast which extended from neck down to vent. References show these two kingbirds as only species with this degree of brilliance and extent. Head gray, profile of that of kingbird which I have seen many times in western US and tropics. Size same as for other yellow breasted kingbirds. Gray tail with no marginal white ornament. No photo obtained as I was too busy looking at the bird. Host also saw the bird (he did not have binos).
