Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Looked out office window to see a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher sitting on fence and rushed down the hall to take pictures of STFL. Upon watching STFL, finally realized that there was a yellow kingbird sitting on fence near the STFL's initial perch.

15. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): . Large flycatcher (not as big as STFL but bigger than nearby Eastern Phoebes) with yellow breast up to the neck line, grey head, stout black bill with black stripe through eye, olive-green on back between the wings. The bird flew off shortly after the STFL and was seen antagonizing STFL as both birds flew around the mowed field before flying off, more or less together to the north. Eliminated Western Kingbird by thickness of bill and the yellow on the breast was higher than typical WEKI.

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Western Kingbird – though not common around complex, one stayed around for approximately two weeks in February/March 2020. The bird observed had a stouter/thicker bill than WEKI with more yellow on the chest.
