- 7. Other observers accompanying reporter who also *identified* the bird(s): Joan Garvey, Mark Meunier, Becky Lloyd
- 8. Other observers who independently identified the bird(s): David Muth and Peter Yaukey saw the bird less than half an hour earlier and alerted us to it. The bird vocalized for them and was identified as a Tropical rather than Couch's. It seems reasonable to assume that we were looking at the same bird since the location was the same.
- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): Overcast but bright enough to see colors well.
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): 10 x 42 Swarovski bins
- 11. Distance to bird(s): about 90 feet (used Google Earth ruler to get distance)

- 12. Duration of observation: 15 min
- 13. Habitat: Tree line at edge of marshy area close to I-10. Near where powerline crosses the levee.
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): We were standing on the levee. Bird was first seen on the powerline then we saw it fly to the treeline. During the 15 or so minutes that we were there it perched at the top of two different trees.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen*; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently*, *stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): A little smaller and less chunky than a robin. Maybe about the size of a cardinal. Bright yellow belly, white throat, gray head, darker gray area from base of bill through eye and a bit beyond (ear patch). Wings and notched tail were darker with an olive green cast. Black thick pointed bill, black eyes no eyering, dark legs.
- 16. Voice: It did not vocalize where we observed it. We did not try playback since David Muth used it and got a response to confirm the ID as a Tropical Kingbird.
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): No white outer tail feathers, therefore, not a Western Kingbird. Vocalization confirmed Tropical not Couch's.
- 18. Photographs or tape recordings obtained? (by whom? attached?): My photos are attached. Muth's and Garvey's are in eBird reports.
- 19. Previous experience with this species: Seen in south Texas a number of times. Seen last year at Capitol Lake and several times in Louisiana.
