9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): bird was always perched in the open, but sky was dull and overcast, so not much sunlight

10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): Vortex HD 8x42 Diamondbacks – new, Vortex HD 10x50 – new, Nikon D40 (ca. ten years), 70-300mm telephoto lens (four years?)

11. Distance to bird(s): varying, ca. 30ft. – 100ft.

12. Duration of observation: on and off for a total of ca. 15 minutes

13. Habitat: levee system with surrounding marsh and scrubby habitat

14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Bird was initially seen fighting to stay openly perched in the wind, then disappeared for some time before reappearing back towards the south end of the levee, attempting to forage, this time perched much lower, only a couple of feet off the ground.

Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): Yellow-bellied kingbird with yellow coming all the way up to the upper chest and becoming slightly greenish below throat. Gray head and back with dark wings and tail. Bill thicker and longer than in WEKI. No white outer tail feathers.

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Couch's Kingbird – voice, Western Kingbird – voice, has white outer tail feathers and smaller bill, Cassin's Kingbird – voice, smaller bill and whiter throat.
