- 9. Light conditions (position of bird in relation to shade and to direction and amount of light): bird was in the top of a tree facing the sun on a clear morning
- 10. Optical equipment (type, power, condition): 10x40 binoculars and Nikon Coolpix P950 camera
- 11. Distance to bird(s): approx. 150 ft.
- 12. Duration of observation: 15 sec (Just long enough to get a crappy picture)

- 13. Habitat: In this area the batture is dominated by Black Willow. Adjacent area is park of roads, parking, athletic fields and shade trees (mostly Live Oaks).
- 14. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Flycatcher behavior: perched, flew out (and out of sight) but returned to perch after 5-10 seconds. It flew again after a 10-15 seconds and didn't return.
- 15. Description (include only what was actually seen, *not what "should" have been seen;* include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species; body bulk, shape, proportions; bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species, *or for species that are known to hybridize frequently, stress features that help eliminate possible hybrids*): Struck me as slightly larger and heavier than Great Crested Flycatcher. Otherwise just caught glimpse of yellow and dark eye stripe. To be honest, I didn't know what I saw until I got home, reviewed the photo and looked through Sibley's.
- 16. Voice: didn't vocalize
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Tropical/Couches are very similar, hence recording the observation as such. Lacked boldness of Great Kiskadee.
- 18. Photographs or tape recordings obtained? (by whom? attached?): Photo attached.
- 19. Previous experience with this species: Very limited. I have one recorded sighting from 2006. The record is from a legacy listing program that I no longer have so I don't have much more info. I believe the sighting was made on Grand Isle. The ID was made by a friend who is an expert and published birder from Ontario, Canada.
