Large kingbird with bright yellow ventral surface, dark mask, "blocky" grayish head, greenish dorsal surface, whitish throat area, greenish breast, large beak, culmen with a sharp hook at its end, all dark notched tail. My birding bud heard it calling/singing. Its song was identical to that of the Merlin playback. It did not seem overly interested in the playback to its song, but it did jerk its head a few times when the playback was being used. Photos taken and included.

- 16. Voice: <u>Cheryl Huner</u> heard it singing several times while it was perched near her, I had walked a distance to locate bird.
- 17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Couch's Kingbird has smaller beak more rounded head and its call/song completely different.
