- 13. Duration of observation: 10-15 minutes, but several observations from different positions; it is possible there was more than one TRKI in the area.
- 14. Habitat: Chain link fence, electrical wires, tops of oak trees. There are a lot of open spaces in the area edged/ringed by trees, fences and power lines with good perches for flycatching.
- 15. Behavior of bird / circumstances of observation (flying, feeding, resting; include and stress habits used in identification; relate events surrounding observation): Flycatching sallying out for bugs and then returning to the same position. At one point a pair of CAKI appeared to chase the TRKI away.

Large kingbird with bright lemony yellow belly with yellow all the way up to the throat. Dark stripe through the eye with a dark patch behind the eye, thick heavy bill with pale white throat. Head was light gray (and very distinct from the two nearby CAKI which had much darker gray heads). Bill appeared to have a 'vireo-like' hook at the end. Crown was angular and not very rounded. Primaries appeared to have pale edges review of the photos I took confirmed.

- 18. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Very distinct from the (also present) CAKI and WEKI. I don't think this is a COKI because the bill seemed very large compared to the other kingbirds nearby. https://ebird.org/checklist/S202801926
