In flight, the first sighting on 17 Nov , the single bird did glide into a strong headwind on occasion. On 30 Nov, the four seen were more flittery, little gliding. Mostly about 15-30 m above the ground. Not necessarily associating with Tree Swallows that were mostly lower over the water.

Description (include only what was actually seen, not what "should" have been seen; include if possible: total length/relative size compared to other familiar species, body bulk, shape, proportions, bill, eye, leg, and plumage characteristics. Stress features that separate it from similar species): Small swifts, looking smaller than Chimney, with narrower, shorter wings resulting in more rapid flittery flight style. In good light, throat and much of underparts were a pale, creamy brownish (like coffee with cream), the rump was noticeably paler than remainder of back and tail.

17. Similar species (include how they were eliminated by your observation): Chimney is larger, longer and broader-winged (especially with a broad "bump" at the base of the primaries on trailing edge), less contrast on underparts and rump.
