- 13. Habitat: On asphalt road facing east with grassy field on the south and fenced in oilfield company property on the north. Ditches were full of water from Huricane Nate.

The 4 of us mentioned above came in the day before the Terrebonne Bird Club field trip. We were driving around and had just seen an American Kestrel. I don't see from far well but spot well. I saw a larger bird ahead on a telephone pole that looked like a kestrel but much larger. Assumed it was a Peregrine Falcon and left it at that. David Booth arrived much later at our camp and when I mentioned this to him he asked to see the photograph. I showed him. He immediately knew that it was a white tailed hawk. Karen displayed the bird on her iPad in her Sibley app. David said it was a rare and good find. He also said he would follow up with additional information on the find.
