A dark hawk with a white chest spot and pale tail.

Head darkly hooded, dark brown on back and onto breast, with dark streaks onto belly. White blaze on center of breast. Underwing coverts patterned dark. Flight feathers below pale-based with dusky distal half or third. Undertail coverts whitish, tail pale with dusky tips. Uppertail coverts appeared whitish, indicating a plumage beyond juvenile.
